

<u>SHE JOINED THE BOARD ... AND STAYED FOR 33 YEARS</u> By Dennis Dillon (Proud Board Member)

In 1988, shortly after Diane and Russ Ortlip had moved to St. Louis from Columbus, Ohio, they joined St. Mark Presbyterian Church in Ballwin and met the pastor, Reverend Dr. Howard Gleason.

Gleason told the Ortlips about Lafayette Industries, which he had helped found in 1976. Diane learned that there was an opening on Lafayette's Board of Directors.

Diane had an awareness and empathy for people with disabilities that went back to her childhood in Columbus. When she was nine, her sister Valerie was born with Down syndrome. Valerie also had cardio-pulmonary issues which kept her in and out of hospitals.

Diane and her older brother helped their parents care for Valerie, who passed away when she was only four.

In 1989, Diane decided to fill the Lafayette Board opening, thinking she would serve for a few terms. She wound up serving for 33 continuous years -33 — before she announced her retirement in October.

Over the years, Diane worked on multiple Board committees and volunteered at many fundraisers, including the picnic golf shootouts and the mouse races. She was there for the highs, such as the expansions of both the West facility in Manchester and the North facility in Berkley. And she was there for the lows, such as when former Lafayette executive director George Schumacher was tragically killed in an automobile accident August 26, 2003.

"I've seen a lot of changes, a lot of Board members come and go," Diane said.

Diane graduated from Ohio State University, where she earned a teaching degree. Later, she took some graduate-level courses and became certified to teach special education. After three years of teaching, she earned a law degree and worked as an attorney for the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities from 1984-88.

The Ortlips moved to St. Louis with their daughter Valerie to be closer to Russ's parents, who were retired and living in Arkansas. Soon, they had another daughter, Allison. When Allison was two, Diane went back to work fulltime and ended up working for two St. Louis law firms before retiring in 2020.

All the while, she was a constant on the Lafayette Board. What impressed her so much that she stayed on for so long?

"The dedication of the Board members and their level of involvement in making sure that the facilities are well run, and their interest in the sheltered workers—and also the staff," she said. "I really enjoy seeing the workers and how they love working there."

Diane won't have any trouble occupying her post-Lafayette time. Four of her five grandchildren live in Kirkwood (a fifth lives in Chicago), and there will be lots of soccer games, hockey games, swimming lessons and babysitting. She likes to play golf and belongs to a Tuesday women's group at Ballwin Golf Course. And she and Russ love to travel to new places in the U.S.

Next year, Diane will turn 70, and she and Russ will be married for 40 years. To celebrate those anniversaries, they have planned a family trip to Ireland in June. They also hope to visit London to watch the Cardinals play the Cubs in a two-game series.

"That's what we're looking forward to," Diane said.

What she can look back on is a time well served on the Lafayette Board.

ANOTHER TAX SEASON IS JUST AROUND THE CORNER By Peter LaSalle

Although Dick has retired, we plan to offer tax preparation services at Lafayette Industries this year. You'll see one familiar face (mine) and a new face (Ellen's), she has worked for several years at Salem Methodist as a preparer.

Now is a good time to get a new check register from your bank for 2023, even as you start collecting data and your thoughts in preparation for income tax time. As your tax information begins to come in, keep it in a safe place and find last year's return to begin the file. For those of you that are required to take a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from your IRA plan/s, make sure that you

will have received your entire RMD by year's end because there is a stiff penalty for not doing so.

Many Lafayette employees owe no tax but may be eligible for the Earned Income Tax Credit and possibly the Missouri Property Tax Credit (Circuit Breaker). A review of the employee's income, disability status and housing rental expense determines eligibility. Tax returns will be completed using the IRS computer tax preparation system and e-filed with the IRS and state of Missouri. Federal income, state income and property tax credit (if applicable) forms completed as one package. Hopefully we will be able take appointments in January, and then begin doing returns the third week of February.

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS

1) We want to remind everyone that earlier this year they were informed of a change in the vacation policy. The balance of vacation hours won't roll over to the new calendar year, but will be deleted at the end of the year. Then on January hours will be renewed, and the employee will have their new total number of vacation hours for the year. For this reason we have been encouraging people to take their hours so they don't lose them. Common sense.

2) West folks – we request that you send us a note for your vacation days in advance. We are reiterating that if a problem crops up, then we will have a way to check your hours and what went wrong. But you have to tell us you want vacation hours. Please be sure and send an email to <u>bstillwell@lafayetteindustries.com</u> to let us know about your desired time off. Thanks in advance for your help.

3) If you are sick, please stay home. You're not the most dedicated employee if you come in sneezing, hacking and runny nose dripping everywhere. What you are doing is spreading your illness to folks who don't need to be exposed to your germs. Again, we appreciate you using good common sense. Good common sense says stay home when you're sick, and don't make everyone else sick.

ROBIN CORPORA'S CARNIVAL CRUISE




