VICKY JAMES HONORED AT MISSOURI CAPITOL

Lafayette Chief Advancement Officer Vicky James was honored during A Team Missouri's "Day of Choice" March 21 at the Missouri State Capitol in Jefferson City.

First-term Representative Ken Waller (Rep.) of District 114 in Jefferson County recognized James on the floor of the Missouri House of Representatives, citing her more than 30 years of executive management and leadership in both the private and public sectors.

James served as president and CEO of Sunnyhill Inc., in Fenton, Mo., for 22 years. She also was the COO for Chapel Hill Mortuary in Cedar Hill, Mo. On April 1, she celebrated her one-year anniversary at Lafayette.

Missouri A Team, whose motto is "Dignity Has a Voice," was created to advocate in a grassroots effort for adults with disabilities and their families who choose employment at sheltered workshops across the state. It creates awareness in the community and advises elected officials on the importance of legislation for adults with disabilities.

Nearly 200 Missouri A Team members and their supporters from sheltered workshops across the state sat in the gallery of the Missouri House and were recognized from the floor. During their visit to the Capitol, they had opportunities to visit with their area legislators and then had a group picture taken on the floor of the Capitol rotunda.

In addition to James, Lafayette Industries was represented by Executive Director Rob Libera, Executive Coordinator Kate Gregor, CFO Scott Skarstad, and Board of Directors member Dennis Dillon.

BRAD DAVIS'S 2023 ANTARCTICA TRIP







Day 1: We landed in Santiago, Chile early in the morning. Since we were only spending one day in the city, we decided to go on a driving tour. Our guide showed us not only the major cultural and historical sites, but also the

best places to shop and experience the nightlife.

The fortress of Cerro Santa Lucia, where the Spanish Conquistador, Pedro de Valdivia, founded the city of Santiago. It's located atop a hill in the heart of the city.

The view of the city from the top of the hill. It was 90° and sunny that day but ongoing wildfires left the air smoggy.

La Monde Palace, the seat of the Chilean government. The 13 flags outside represent the 13 Chilean States.

A statue of President Eduardo Frei Montalva, who was ousted by Pinochet's Coup in 1970, outside of the palace.

Day 2: In the morning we flew from Santiago to the city of Punta Arenas. Punta Arenas is a city of 120k that lies along the Strait of Magellan on the southernmost tip of South America. It acts as a port for ships travelling through the strait as well as one of the main travel hubs for people visiting Chilean Patagonia and Terra del Fuego. We spent most of our time there preparing for the cruise, getting fitted for our boots and parkas, learning the rules for shore expeditions and meeting our fellow travelers.

Day 3: After lunch we left our hotel and finally boarded our flight to Antarctica. The airfield we were supposed to land at was a short, gravel runway attached to Frei Station, a Chilean military base on King George Island. This meant that our pilot had to land the plane entirely by sight, and if the weather turned we would have no choice but to wait for another day. Fortunately the weather held, and we were able to land safely on our first try. There was no dock on the island big enough for our ship, so we had to take the Zodiacs out to it.





The planes we took to King George Island (the larger ones). Since we were landing on a very short runway we were limited to 30 lbs. of checked luggage, which isn't a lot when you're packing for the Antarctic. Thankfully, the boots and parka were provided by the cruise and not included in that weight limit.



One of the Zodiacs. This was from later in the trip, as taking photos while on the base was strictly forbidden, and I didn't want to get my phone confiscated. I ended up sitting in the front and took a splash of Antarctic water right in the face when we hit a particularly large swell.



The picture on the right is of our ship, the Ocean Adventurer. Also from later in the trip; I wasn't confident taking pictures on my first zodiac ride. There were a little over 100 passengers and 120 crew.

The gangway: This was the only way we could get on or off the ship.

The hatch while underway. After every shore excursion we had to scrub our boots in the tubs on the right to prevent cross-contamination, and also to get rid of the smell of penguin.

Our room, small but comfortable. You can feel the rocking of the ship even in calm bays, let alone the open ocean.

The deck outside our room. We were on a cruise, but the ship was built for expetions first and foremost. The hatches were heavy, the stairs





were steep, and the outside docks were metal and weathered wood.



The Main (and only) Dining Room. Breakfast and lunch were served buffet style, and dinner was a la carte. All of the chairs were chained to their tables, which made getting up a a bit of a pain.

The Main Lounge where people hung out while underway. This was also wehre the various



scientists on the crew gave lectures on the things we'd encounter.

Day 4: During the night, we sailed from Frei Station across the Bransfeild to Mikkelsen Harbor. Mikkelsen Harbor was discovered by Otto Nordenskjöld, during his 1901-1904 expedition. It was used as a safe harbor for whaling vessels. After lunch we put on our gear and boarded the Zodiacs to go see the penguin colonies that live on the island.



Sailing into Mikkelson Harbor. You could see (and smell) the penguin colonies from a good distance away.

One of the colonies established itself around an old hut. The hut is still used as an emergency shelter for researchers.







Penguins near the bones of a long-dead whale. You can also see the remains of a water-ship. These ships would collect water and bring it to the factory ships that processed whale oil. They were also used as platforms by the whalers who cut the blubber from the whales.

A better view of the ship is to



the right above. Whalers would breach ships like this in the off-season rather than take them with them. The extra oil this let them carry more than made up for any repairs they would have to make.

A pair of gentoo penguins. The one on the right is in the middle of molting, a process that can take several weeks. During this time, they lose their waterproofing and are unable to hunt.

Weddell seals sunning themselves on the beach. Weddell's are the only seals



that don't migrate north for the winter.

Every passenger was assigned to a departure group that left at a specific time but once you were out there you could return whenever you wanted. Instead of coming back, I joined up with a boat that was going to take a tour around the harbor.



You can see where icebergs broke off the glacier.

Antarctic fur seals on the shore. Fur seals are very territorial, and young males spar with each other constantly in preparation for the mating season.





A fur seal looks back at our boat as we drive alongside it.

From Mikkelsen Harbor we sailed south to Curtis Bay. There we boarded the Zodiacs for an evening cruise. The water in the bay was placid and covered in a sheet of loose ice. The Zodiacs were more than tough enough to push through or drive over the ice. But it slowed us down enough that instead of a full tour of the bay, we ended up just making a few laps around our ship.



The water in Curtis Bay was full of drifting ice. The ship's hull was more than strong enough to handle it, but the noise took some getting used to.

The water in the bay was as smooth as glass.
