NO ART CLASSES IN JULY AND AUGUST. We are taking those two months off, and we will start back up on Wednesday, September 6th.



Raise your hand if you've had food poisoning (uggghhhhhhhh!!). Me too. So, let's discuss how to avoid it. However, we will concern ourselves only with the eating side of food safety. What, if, when and how. Maybe we will come back to food preparation in another column.

NEVER leave perishable food out for longer than two hours at room temperature. Consider one hour when it's over 90 degrees (picnics, automobiles). If, by chance, you see food at banquets or catered spreads, or even deliveries, and you don't know how long it's been out, we advise that you don't eat it. This is a

notorious problem in staff lunchrooms and banquet spreads during events.

Leftovers should be refrigerated within two hours of the time it was finished cooking or two hours from the time it was in an appliance to keep the proper temperature. 40 degrees or colder is recommended. They should be eaten within three or four days. If you want to keep them longer, freeze them within that time. It's beneficial to break up large servings into smaller amounts beforehand. It allows them to cool faster and brings additional safety to the process when you are not bringing products in and out of the refrigerator.

All right now, it's Lafayette so I'm stating the obvious. You washed your hands. Let's go to the refrigerator, and there in the back is a covered dish. Hmmmmmm....... Wonder what that is? Let us look. Does it pass the look test? Mold? Excessive wilt? Even just a little bit? DON'T EAT IT! Don't eat it, my friend. Give it the ol' trusty smell test while you are at it.

Look, I get the "don't waste food" line of thinking - I do. But it's just not worth it, folks. Pitch it!


