

BOOTS BERRY: A LIFETIME OF SERVICE TO LAFAYETTE By The Editor

Boots Berry died in late September of 2023. For those of you who know the history of Lafayette, Boots volunteered for 35+ years before having to retire due to illness. She and her friend, Julie, worked alongside our employees all that time. They learned all about their lives, and in the process, the employees got to know what a phenomenal human being Boots was. In October of 2008 the newsletter continued with a series of articles called "In The Spotlight". We introduced folks to various facets of the workshop through different people's eyes. We are running that article in honor of Boots in its entirety. Here it is:



"IN THE SPOTLIGHT: BOOTS BERRY - THE FACE OF VOLUNTEERING

Last month Lafayette Industries celebrated 30 years of service to its community. During that time Lafayette has moved twice, expanded with Lafayette North, and has undergone lots of changes. Lafayette has been so successful due in large part to its extraordinary volunteers who give freely of their time. Boots Berry is one of these dedicated people who recently celebrated her birthday. She is a former Board member and has been a volunteer at Lafayette since its beginnings. Boots has been married for 59 years to her husband, Bob. She had two children –

Becky and Bob, Jr., both of whom are married. She has four grand -daughters – Abigail, Sarah, Caitlin and Jill – who are the joys of her life. I asked her to write her story for us:

'I got involved with LWC because of Kenny McLuen. Kenny became a special friend of my family and me when I helped "pattern" him until he went to Special School. About this time different groups from West County, including St. Mark Presbyterian Church, began working to get a Sheltered Workshop started. Kenny always told me that when he became 21 and could no longer go to Special School, there would be a workshop. He turned 21 on August 19, 1976, and early the next month on a Monday morning, LWC opened in a very small rented building in Valley Park with 12 workers. The next day I was there volunteering and for 30 years, Tuesday has been LWC day. I met Julie Simpson that day and what a good friend she has become, plus being my Tuesday buddy.

We had two locations in Valley Park, and a flood which brings back memories of getting a tetanus shot and hosing down lockers and other equipment. What a cleanup. But we survived.

I have been blessed to be a small part of this organization which has grown from 12 to serving over 200 productive special people. I was on a committee working to get a sheltered workshop going, served on the Board, but volunteering in the plant with the workers is where my heart is. I would like to think I've helped in production and in "quality control," but I guess my biggest contribution has been in giving and receiving hugs, listening to what is going on in their lives – and just being their friend.

What a rewarding 30 years it's been! I'm not through yet − Julie and I have a lot more birthday cards to hand out! Thanks, Kenny!""




ADAM BIRDSONG'S 2023 ROADTRIP

Then we drove to Utah and our first of 4 National Parks. First we went to Zion National Park and did several hikes then rode the trams back to base.













Next stop was Southern Colorado and Durango / Silverton. We drove the scenic byway, went up to Silverton and saw the steam train, spent a couple hours in the hot springs. We finally saw our first peek of snow over the lakes up around 12,500 feet.











Next stop was the Great Sand Dunes National Park north of Alamosa, Colorado. It was 56 degrees with a wind chill of around 50! We were a little cold, but it was really cool!

Last stop was Colorado Springs, Pikes Peak and the Garden of the Gods. We rode the train up to the top of Pikes Peak (one of Colorado's Fourteeners). It was covered with snow and fogged in for the most part. 20 degrees up on top and 78 where we started.









All in all we drove about 1,600 miles, found all but 7 state license plates represented in our travels and flew home from Denver. All parks were wonderful, contained charts showing the types of hikes, difficulty, type of terrain, etc. Best summary we've seen, and allowed us to get to trails easily to match up with Adam's ability.


