THE BEGINNING OF LAFETTE WORK CENTER ("LWC") By Bob and Ethel McLuen

"Lafayette Work Center was founded during the years of 1975-76 by several organizations which included parents who were interested in establishing a sheltered workshop for adults with disabilities. At that time this community did not have a workshop. Also there was no Productive Living Board to supply money. After searching for available space, the workshop was opened in September 1976 with 16 workers in a small rented building in Valley Park. In order to rent this building, the Teschner, McLuen and Mertz families guaranteed the \$10,000 lease if LWC could not pay. Because the building had previously housed a rather greasy and dirty operation, we found it necessary to cover the floor with tile. Luckily a member of the Board owned a flooring company and supplied the tile which the parents were able to install. We hired a Director and partitioned the area for his office. I remember when he moved into his office he placed a Bible on the shelf, and I felt certain we were going to be successful. One of our first contracts was to package powdered Clorox. As a result the workers had to remove their shoes when they arrived home so they would not ruin the family floors. In this rented space we managed to have parties and dances for the workers. The parents car-pooled as there was no transportation.

I am certain our success has been due to Directors who know what it takes to be successful in business while showing empathy for adults with disabilities.

A "working" Board of Directors - our first bookkeeper-treasurer was a Board Member. The Board Members solicited work-orders and donations.

Support from Parents, churches and the community all contributed to the growth of our workshop."

On behalf of the current and past Board of Directors; the Staff, Parents and Guardians; our Supporters; and most important, all the current and past dedicated workers of Lafayette Industries whose lives had been enhanced through the joy of employment—we thank "our Founding Fathers" of LWC and the Founding Fathers of I.T.E, now known as Lafayette Industries North, Inc., for having the vision, compassion, dedication, and perseverance to start this Dream and continue to create Opportunities for folks just wanting a chance to show what they can do.

The Dream continues and as we continue to meet the employment needs of adults with disabilities, as we have gained approval to start the design for our Expansion at Lafayette Industries North! What a great "Birthday" present!

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: ODYSSEY OF A FAMILY WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

OUR SPECIAL GIFT

Pamela Renee Burton was the third gift from God for Harold and Ruby Burton. She came to us on November 14, 1958. Three months after we brought this precious gift home she began to make some gestures that I knew were not normal behavior. The involuntary slumping forward with outstretched arms was later diagnosed as epilepsy. At the age of eight months, after many trips to various doctors, Pam was diagnosed at St. Louis Children's Hospital as having Petite Mal Seizures. Once the diagnosis was made, we were told of some of the things that we could expect. Mentally, emotionally and intellectually she would not be able to keep up with her siblings. I was told that she might not walk, talk or see clearly. She was given at first several medications, but the seizures didn't stop. At the age of 2½ our pediatrician thought that since the medication was not helping to stop the seizures, that we should discontinue it altogether. This way Pam could function at her fullest potential; and stopping the medication made her condition no better or worse.

With much love and prayer we struggled through months of emotions and fear of the unknown. Somewhere between the age 2½ and 3 years of age Pam's seizures stopped just as abruptly as they started. Pam's diagnosis was a great blow to us to say the least. Her brain was damaged and at best we were looking at a trainable child. How would we cope with this crisis was our question. As a family we simply knew that we had to be there for each other and our parents and other family members were there to support us.

As a 23 year old stay at home mom, I began to make phone calls seeking help. I combed the phone book for organizations, agencies, I queried doctors every chance I got. I was directed to St. Louis Association for Retarded Children (SLARC) and sent to psychiatrics and this opened up many avenues for us. Our first program was preschool which was a great help because by now there is the 4th gift from heaven a SON. Pam started preschool at the age of 3 and went through Special School District (SSD) until she was 21 years of age. She left (SSD) and went directly into The Life Skill Program and from there to work in Sheltered Workshops. Pam in our family has been a challenge and a privilege to do a special work for God. We more or less saw her as a special assignment from heaven that we as a family were chosen to spearhead. Every thing that Pam learned to do was a milestone from eating bread to eating meat because chewing was something she did not do. So her

diet consisted of soft food like oatmeal, mashed potatoes, eggs or grits, until she was around 2 years old.

Having her in the family I believe helped to make her siblings and other family members into people with patience, tolerance and compassion. Her daily interaction with her family has helped her to do many, many things in terms of adjusting to life because she always thought she was supposed to do what the other siblings did. Pam's coming into our family didn't seem like it could have had any positive outcome for us but I am happy to say that it did. Pam is the joy of the family in so many ways. She's a people person. Her social life has more often than not been very positive due to available programs with Life Skills and other agencies. Pam's need for support led me to caring people like all of the friends of ITE and all of the understanding people I've met through agencies.

Pam also loves her job and absenteeism is unheard of unless scheduled. Sometimes she mimics the behavior of others on the job about being too tired and going to quit and I don't like this one and that one; but if she thought she couldn't come to work she would be devastated. Her respect for authority always helps her through the rough times in this area.

Pam's coming into our family has allowed us to realize that life is challenging for all of us and no ability should be taken for granted. Pam is learning from us constantly, every day she seems to be mellowing in to our life style so perfectly. Her likes and dislikes are so much like her parents that our lifestyles do not clash. We are amazed at the things she can do just from being in the family environment day after day. Her ability to do for herself has improved greatly. I am now able to just add the finishing touches for Pam in the mornings. We still have some learning challenges ahead of us but we are very hopeful for Pam. We believe that she will eventually overcome most of her anxieties and inabilities and become the diamond that God through family, friends and you is chipping her to be. Thanks to all of the staff of Lafayette and friends of ITE and the system for being in her chipping process.

SAFETY THOUGHTS FOR MAY 2024

LADDERS

Hello, my safety conscious friends. Spring and summer are the time the ladders come out of the shed, garage, or like my own, along the side of the shed. Having made untold numbers of bad decisions with ladders (don't ask), I've gone to a few of my trusted safety sites for help here. One is the HASpod Training and Safety Company. The other trusted safety site being the Alliance Safety Company.

I must appreciate what one writer was thinking when they wrote, "#1 Don't Use One." He was serious. The point is that if you're going to use a ladder for long durations, use something else. Scaffolding is one way. Another is using a MEWP. I sound so smart writing that, don't I? No? Ok. Anyway, that stands for Mobile Elevated Working Platforms. These things are great folks. Lafayette has a couple at our plants, I'm sure most of you have seen. I rented one to paint some very high peaks on our home. Worked beautifully.

If we are going to use ladders, here are a few rules to keep us safe:

- 1. Check the area. Overhead wires? Overhead obstructions? Level ground?
- 2. Check the ladder! Warped or split metal rungs or sides? Rotten wood?
- 3. Keep area at bottom of ladder clear of clutter, boxes, conduit, cardboard, etc. Slip and fall for sure.
- 4. Never, never, never, never get on top rung!
- 5. The 4/1 Rule: Distance from leaning surface is one-quarter of intended height or a 75% angle.
- 6. Carrying loads. One hand on that ladder always.
- 7. Don't lean outside the ladder rails.

We hope this gets you safely through the outdoor ladder season, and in our plants, "Let's be careful in there!"
